Late this month I will attend a brief conference in Nashville, TN called Intergenerate. The name is intriguing because it puts together both the words, intergenerational and generate. The conference is a gathering of people who love the church and who wish to share and learn about a growing trend in the church – intergenerational learning and worship. This might seem like a no-brainer, of course church is intergenerational. For a long while the mainline protestant church has taken its cues from the culture – maintaining programs for age specific groups, and in many ways that has worked. As we all know, the church and its place in the culture, is changing. A discovery that is teaching the church is something very old, that the church is healthiest and more who it is meant to be when we live and learn together across generations. The old and not-so-old have much to pass on to the young, and clearly the young and very young have much to teach the grown and old. Stuck in our modes of thinking and training for so long, it is helpful to gather round with others who love the church and learn from each other – be given the opportunity to open our ideas up to some sunlight and fresh air, and breathe in the message the Spirit is suggesting for a new day.

Keith has already been working this idea that he has been hearing at APCE, as we have had several Family Days – of parents and children – it makes me think we ought to expand this to grandparents and godparents – all of us around here. In September, Candace Hill spoke about "Imperfect Faith for Imperfect Parenting;" in October, we Remembered Our Baptism; in November we discussed "Participating in Communion;" in December we Celebrated the Liturgical Year; in January How to Read the Bible Together; in February, The Golden Rule and Being Good Stewards; in March, the beautiful little book by Jill McGill and Keith was shared about Worship and Our Sanctuary; and on Palm Sunday, the Story of Holy Week. Won't you all come May 19, in the Fellowship Hall – on Being a Presbyterian.

I grew up in a church about the size of Wayside, with Sunday School and youth group. But the most important and formative relationships for me happened in the in-between, at church dinners, at churchwide retreats, where I learned to know adults who were not my family, and who showed me over time how very much they valued me and loved me. The lines between family and church blurred, and some of those Christian folk who loved me so well have been as important to my growth and life as a follower of Christ as were my own family members. I can see their faces in my memory, and remember their love in my hearts this very moment.

This is an important part of what it means to be the church. I am looking forward to three packed days to hear from others, ways the church is doing its essential work of forming people as follower of Christ, using the tools the Holy Spirit gives us to learn and grow – the gift of each other.

After victims are examined and consoled, they are often in a state of shock with nowhere to turn. By offering these patients a small gift bag with a few toiletries, new under garments, a sweet and inspirational message, they are being shown love and mercy at a time when they feel abandoned,

We are once again needing items to restock the ER supply of underwear, sport's bras, tiny stuffed animals, and knitters willing to make pocket prayer squares. We will have small "wish lists" on the information table for your wallet, as a reminder of small items needed for this project. Directions for the pocket square will also be there as well. Whatever you can supply will be a blessing to this project: tooth paste and tooth brush, lotion, gum or hard candies, chapstick, combs, brushes, flip flops, disposable razors, shaving cream, sports bras, & underwear.

Calling All Shoes, Shoe Collection!

Calling for gently used or new but hardly worn shoes. During May and June bring pairs rubber banded together and place in the boxes in the church lobby. Please bring shoes that are practical, even if more formal. Shoes with very high heels are less marketable. Good quality collected shoes are a commodity in the developing world and are part of a resource stream for micro-entrepreneurs who purchase them from the supplier at very low cost, and sell for profit. The supplier returns a percentage to sponsoring organizations. We are working with local mission, Chosen International. The proceeds they receive from funds2orgs, the mission that supplies the shoes to far-flung communities all over the world, go into Chosen's work providing medical supplies and short term medical missionaries to train and serve

alongside providers in developing countries.

The Iftar Dinner – Wednesday, May 15 – Fellowship Hall

Our friends from the Turkish Cultural Center will treat us to the breaking of the daily fast the Muslim faithful observe during the month of Ramadan. This occurs at sundown, which is at 8:34 pm on May 15. Please arrive by 8:15 as our friends who have fasted through the day will be pleased to enjoy the meal, and we hope to feast at sundown. All are welcome to attend the Iftar – please make known your intention by signing in the lobby or sending a message to the church office by May 15.

Fasting is one of the five pillars of the Islamic faith, and during the Islamic holy month of Ramadan, Muslims fast every day from sunrise to sunset. The pre-dawn meal is known as *Suhoor*, and the fast-breaking meal eaten after sunset is called *Iftar*. Traditionally, the fast is broken with dates or something small before the daily evening prayer. Besides fasting, another of the pillars of Islam is the ritual prayer, performed five times a day. This is done throughout the year, and one of the daily prayers is done at sunset. So often, fasters will break the daily fast with dates or a small bit of food, pray the evening prayer, and then eat a full Iftar meal.

Fasting is a spiritual discipline many Christians follow to remember that we are God's creatures, dependent upon God for everything we not only eat, but everything that is, it all, even things humans make, comes from the earth, which God made. Fasting provides a setting in which our prayer is shaped by realization of our dependence, and our acknowledgement of the great love that has made us, and redeemed us, and that sustains us always. BUDGET BYTES from the Budget Committee

"Do all you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." (John Wesley)

John Wesley may have been a Methodist but his message is one to which we Waysiders can aspire. In June the Session will again consider whether to approve the 2019 deficit budget for the remaining six months of the year. In January the budget was approved for six months, with the hopes that by June our revenues would paint a rosier picture, bringing us out of a deficit stance.

Where do we stand on these hopes as of the beginning of April? We expected to show an overall shortfall of (\$29,924.21) and in actuality, we now have a shortfall of (\$26,029.12), meaning we performed \$3,985.08 better than projected (glass half full, anyone?). In terms of year-to-date revenues, 2019 pledges are coming in as budgeted, unpledged contributions are about \$500 below projections, and the Per Capita appeal is about \$1,000 below projections. Expenses are on target, thanks to the diligence of many folks, especially our wonderful staff.

However, it remains that we are still in deficit mode and that is where John Wesley's philosophy may be helpful for us to prayerfully consider. As you consider how you have been blessed this year, is it possible for you to "do all you can, by all the means you can" in terms of increasing your financial support of Wayside's mission? Can you increase your 2019 pledge? Can you add a bit more to the weekly collection plate? Can you contribute to the Per Capita appeal with \$31 for each confirmed member of your family? Whatever you "can do" to help eliminate our deficit and move us to more solid ground will be gratefully received.

Deuteronomy 3

Sermon: The Greatest Coming Out Story of All Time
