Squeezed in between October with its pumpkin spice and December with the build up to Christmas is a favorite holiday for many, Thanksgiving Day. The beauty of the day is in its relative simplicity of food, family and friends. (and some will add football) Different from the October and December holidays, the celebration of a day of thanksgiving is a Biblical norm. It is an ancient practice (Deuteronomy 26) and it has to do with giving thanks, and sharing with others from the good things God has provided.

Wayside is good at Thanksgiving. You folks are so generous in sharing. Providing food to hungry people is central to our mission here: CROP Walk, Emmaus Soup Kitchen, West Millcreek Food Pantry, Produce Express, Second Harvest Food Bank, Upper Room, Erie City Mission, Rise Against Hunger; the list goes on. I am grateful that we keep on sharing year round. There is a community influx of giving during November and December, but the need exists year round.

According to the Erie Community Foundation (<u>www.erievitalsigns.org</u>) over the last two decades the median household income in Erie County is \$48,200.00, down from \$53,900.00 in 2000; in the city it is \$35,800.00, down from \$41,800.00 in 2000. The most concerning to me is that in Erie County 25% of children live below the poverty line, a number that has increased 9% since 2000. In the city 39% of children live below the poverty line, an increase of 12% since 2000. The rate for the state of Pennsylvania is 19% and for the U.S. 20%. These numbers relate to the problem of hunger in our community.

I am grateful that as a church we are doing much to alleviate the hunger of many in our region. I know we will continue to do this. When Debby Irving was here she told an African parable about the people along the river bank who kept seeing babies floating by on the river. Each time they would dash in and save the baby, and do the same as another came, and another. Soon, someone jumped up and said, "Let's keep saving babies, but I am going to head up river to find out what is causing these babies to be in the river in the first place." I am grateful that we feed as many as we can. I wonder what is going on "upriver". I wonder if there are things we can do, and what some of them might be to work on the systemic problems that may change lives.

I thank God for you and for your generosity and kindness. You make a difference for many. "Then celebrate all the good things the Lord your God has done for you and your family – each one of you along with the priests and the foreigners who are among you." Deuteronomy 26:11

Issues of Faith: "The King James Bible: Its Origin and Impact" (October 27 & November 3)

Session I: "Birth: Why and How The King James Bible Came to Be"

In January 1604, James I, the newly crowned king, summoned England's quarrelsome religious leaders to Hampton Court Palace to settle a variety of serious religious issues. Though not an intended outcome, the meeting's primary achievement was the creation of a "People's Bible:" an English translation to be used by both clergy and the masses. The first edition the KJV came off the press seven years later. *It is still in print today.*

Session II: "Impact: The King James Bible and the World"

"I have a dream that every valley shall be exalted."- Martin Luther King, Jr.

Milton wrote about it, Bosch painted from it, and both Abraham Lincoln and Martin Luther King Jr. borrowed from it, especially its calls for charity and civility. From Handel's 'Messiah' to Coolio's 'Gangsta's Paradise,' the King James Bible has affected and inspired a wide swath of cultural expression throughout the English-speaking world. Its poetic cadences and vivid imagery helped shape Western culture. The men who saw the earth from space quoted from it. Fifty-five percent of American Bible readers still reach most often for the King James Version ("The Bible in American Life: 2014). Let's take a look at why.

BUDGET BYTES from the Budget Committee

Can this be? Two back-to-back positive financial months? Yes, it can and it is.

August brought us the success of *Erie Gives* and September continued with generous Waysiders giving of their resources to support God's important work. We have not stayed in the black as we were in August, but we are \$35,138.06 better than where we had projected the budget to be by September 30. We were projected to have a deficit of (\$42,524.18) but instead we sit at (\$7,386.12) and that is cause for celebration and thankfulness.

How was that achieved? Our revenues for September were over budget in both pledged and unpledged giving (nearly \$9,000 higher). On the expense side, there are two major factors which helped to contribute to a total expense savings of \$15,687.81: building expenses year-to-date are down \$11,019.08 and salary expenses showed a savings of \$925.61.

What are our projections for the final two months of the year? Future revenues may be a bit sluggish as *Erie Gives* brought in some monies earlier than anticipated but then again, we may just keep up our pattern of steady and faithful giving, especially in December which traditionally is a "big" month, financially as well as spiritually. Expenses could show savings with continued careful management. Only God knows, but we may find ourselves once more in the black by year's end, rather than what was initially projected, a deficit of (\$20,881.45). Let's not call it "wishful thinking"; let's aim for "prayerful thinking"!

ONE TABLE'S GRATITUDE GATHERING




The Tulip Project

Background: The Out Reach committee continues to support the Tulip Project at Erie Hamot/ UPMC. It has been our mission for the last few years to provide comfort to domestic violence and rape victims in our community. Pattering our project on the Lily Project at Saint Vincent's Hospital by the women at Luther Memorial Church, we have adopted this mission at Hamot/ UPMC.

Victims come to hospitals in our community to be examined and consoled after terrible violent acts. Sometimes their under garment are held for evidence, and in a state of shock have nowhere to turn. By offering these patients a small gift bag with a few toiletries, under garments, candy and an inspirational message, they

are being shown love and mercy at a time when they feel abandoned. Out Reach and PW has continued to help fund this mission, but we still need help from you.



Our inspirational words of encouragement and love, are included with these gift bags, attached to a handmade "Pocket Prayer". There are examples and patterns available for you to make these "Pocket Prayers" in your leisure time. Like our other supplies, we need 60-65 of these annually, so keep them coming!
