Last year at this time we did not know what was coming. Other cultures have faced such completely limiting events before, but it has been a long time since our nation has – nothing anyone now living can recall. Someone commented to me about how if people seem to be disengaging from things, don't assume it is because

of disinterest. This comment aligned with something I have been aware of – how people are responding in times and circumstances that are not normal.

What I have seen is a congregation that has been about being Christians in a common life under uncommon times – caring for one another, being in touch with one another, praying for each other, celebrating each other, grieving in common, worshiping together separately, participating separately together in service, gathering outdoors, giving generously, and longing for a return from a kind of exile with hope to be able to worship together. You have been the church all along without the usual benefits of a common place and a common time to join together. You have been the church in the world as Christ has called you and equipped you to be. You have done and been what you would have hoped you would do and be in such an unusual time. When things are not normal.

Scholars said Judaism was formed in the exile, when the faith and heritage of the people was under threat, when they were in a strange place; when things were not normal. It was not until what really mattered to the people of God was at risk that they worked at keeping it. We can be relieved that our exile is right where we are, and that we live with hope in a restoration coming this year. Still, when the masks are off and we can touch each other, let us retain the lessons of these months. God is with us and has been with us, so this time holds gifts for us. Like the exiles, as we reinhabit places and practices that have stood empty, may we take stock of whose we are and what grace sustains us.

May those who sow in tears reap with shouts of joy. Those who go out weeping, bearing the seed for sowing, shall come home with shouts of joy, carrying their sheaves. Psalm 126:5-6

I neglected to say thanks but now I am reading my second book from that gift and want to say – Thank you very much. I am grateful to God to serve as pastor of Wayside Presbyterian Church.

Many thanks to those who have served as officers of Wayside and are completing their terms of service: Elders Melissa Grimm and Chris Hoyt; Deacons Carrie Bastow, Betsy Deimel, Dick Reese and Dan Taylor; Trustee Jami Sundberg. I think of the gifts and commitment of each of these persons, the faith and love they each exhibit, and realize how very blessed Wayside is to have been well served by this fine group. I also realize and how very deep is the fellowship with them of gifted and willing servants. Thanks be to God for gathering this congregation in and calling forth servant leaders for the congregation and the community in which we minister.

On January 5th the Presbytery of Lake Erie will have a special meeting to act on one topic – the candidate

brought by the General Presbyter Nominating Committee to fill that position. I am grateful to God to tell you that this candidate is the Rev. Anita Bernhardt! If she is elected at the presbytery meeting she will conclude her service at Emmanuel Presbyterian Church on January 15 and begin with the Presbytery on February 1. When I came as your senior pastor 5 years ago Anita was associate presbyter for the Presbytery of Western North Carolina, and some of you might remember she continued that work until September of that year. Before she served in that position she was the interim Association Minister for Western North Carolina (a similar position) in the United Church of Christ. She has continued to have a strong call to "mid-council ministry" and we are grateful that this call has now been realized here.

BUDGET BYTES from the Budget Committee

As this is being written in the dark days of a 2020 pandemic winter we are longing for some financial good news, even as we celebrate the spiritual good news of Jesus' birth. And so, voilà, here is a positive report from Karen, our Financial Secretary, as of the end of November. We will have to wait until December 31 to know how we actually finished the year, financially-speaking, but let's not get ahead of ourselves. We have cause to be pleased with the November report.

Year-to-date budgeted revenue was set to be \$482,000, the actual received was \$479,000, giving us a shortfall of just \$3,000 which was quite amazing considering all the challenges we have faced this year. Pledges were down but unpledged giving was up, including a gratefully received \$10,000 gift over and above one family's regular pledge. As far as YTD expenses, we were budgeted at \$503,000 while actually spending \$474,000, giving us a savings of \$29,000.

In a nutshell: YTD we expected to show a deficit of (\$20,000) but sit at \$5,000 to the good. How is that for good news?

We do have some concern that the \$57,000 that was budgeted to be received in December, based on prior years, might not reach that level considering that there won't be filled pews during the Advent/Christmas season. However, expenses should come in about \$6,000 under budget in December which will help. More importantly, God has already blessed us this year with amazing Wayside generosity and we are thankful for the Spirit-filled and faithful followers of this congregation. We await year's end with hope.

The Legacy Committee: Project Update

The 2 year remediation construction phase of the Legacy Project for the Wayside Presbyterian Church is now completed! The goal has now been met to seal the building from water infiltration. The actions were:

- 1. replacement aged roof membrane sections and shingled areas,
- 2. capping limestone members,
- 3. cleaning/ sealing facia brick/limestone structures,
- 4. replace broken windows,
- 5. replacing windows having rust thru metal frames and single panes with no thermal barrier capacity,
- 6. Air condition high usage rooms.
- 7. The above activity uncovered unknown structural issues limestone ceiling slab and brick columns collapsing along with Fellowship Hall roof at risk with snow load potentially collapsing its structure. These were remediated.
- 8. Music and classroom interior walls were painted having removed blisters and the rusted metal heating panels as well as patched kitchen ceiling and walls with follow up painting. The blue wall tarps are now gone!

The Legacy Project activity cost is \$ 454,013.00. Within this amount, \$ 66,823.00 were unforeseen expenses. The table below shows the church location / problems/ remediation taken and the associated cost. The attached pictures show the key areas that required remediation. The WPC annual report will have the before/ after pictures.

A pledge campaign resulted in a 3 year commitment for years 2019 thru 2021 of \$ 403,742.00 from 88 members. To date Legacy has received \$ 346,686.00. The Committee is profoundly great full for the ongoing generosity by those participating in the Project. If the 2021 pledge of \$ 70,657.00 can be received, a deficit of \$ 36,670.00 is realized. The current 2020 pandemic has made it very difficult for the Committee to seek additional commitments to close on the short fall. Efforts will be undertaken in 2021. Currently the Presbyterian Investment & Loan Program thru the Presbytery is being applied to for Program loan purposes. Details of this action will be communicated during the January 2021 Congregation meeting.

BREAD FOR THE WORLD

This is the first year in many, many years that PW did not sponsor a Bread for the World Offering of Letters. With all the changes in how we accomplish church activities due to the pandemic, we just did not get to this one. It is our goal for 2021 to make it happen! BFW kept very active in 2020 even though it was a year of challenge. In their recent newsletter it was reported that Bread and its members did achieve significant results for those struggling with hunger in part because BFW knows that the ultimate allegiance is to the kingdom of God, not to any political party. Jesus' entrance into this world – born in a manger because there was no room at the inn- reflects the story of those who have been marginalized, deprived, humiliated, and have struggled for a dignified life. BFW continues its effort to end hunger here in the US and around the world.

A major achievement this year is that Congress passed a Global Nutrition Resolution. This bipartisan supported resolution recognizes the importance of United States leadership in the effort to reduce global maternal and child malnutrition – the topic of the 2019 Offering of Letters-


