Pastor's Notes

This is the time when many are making New Year's resolutions. The success people have with this annual practice is mixed. Some of the things most often resolved are diet changes and behavior modification. I think maybe the lack of success is because most of the

things we resolve to do differently are solitary things.

One of the best resolutions I heard about was told by my friend who lives in a large Southeastern city. The church she serves as pastor was established in the 1950s in a thriving middle class neighborhood. As happens in urban settings, over time people aged and their children moved elsewhere, and as generations passed the neighborhood changed and the socio-economic makeup transitioned. The church began to struggle as members passed away and relocated. The church's mission from its inception was to be a light to the community. Over the almost 10 years my friend has been pastor there, she and the congregation have done a good job to live into the changes and know their neighborhood, in all its diversity, as partners in their mission.

My friend shared a long time member's resolution. This man was feeling, at times, in his neighborhood and in his church, a little like a stranger. He decided he had a choice in how he responded to these feelings. His resolution was to "be changed with the new people God is bringing into my life." According to my friend, she could see the results. She saw him, on more than one occasion, holding a baby for a busy mom who is new to the church, and of a different ethnicity. And she has been impressed that he is helping the confirmation class of five youth that is as diverse as the neighborhood. She has seen him at coffee down the block with the old dudes he has always hung out with, no doubt sharing stories about these new things he is doing and people he is knowing. She sees him making new friendships. She wrote, "Imagine how many ways his resolution changes the world and not only him."

What about you and me? Can we resolve to be changed by God's grace like this fellow? It may not result in a slimmer waistline or a neater desk, but likely will work change in concert with God's promise to transform the world.

Happy New Year. May you be blessed to know God's grace and peace all the way along your journey. And may you be a messenger of that blessing to others.

BUDGET BYTES from the Budget/Finance Committee

You are reading this in the new year (Happy New Year to you!) but it's being written during the season of Advent as we eagerly wait for Jesus' arrival. As always, our reports reflect the prior month's finances. Our revenue status as of November 30 was similar to what happened in October in that November also showed a shortfall in receipts. Pledges budgeted for November were short by \$7,000 and unpledged by \$6,000; however, year-to-date pledges were \$10,000 ahead of projections and unpledged giving was \$17,000 ahead of budget, so we'll use the very Christmas-y word "rejoice" to express how we feel about that stat.

As far as expenses, all committees combined showed a savings of \$7,000 YTD. Building expenses were overspent by \$3,000, due to electric bills and building repairs that were 40% higher than two years ago. We can report, however, that YTD expenses reflected a savings of \$20,000, calling for another "rejoice".

For December it has been projected that we will receive revenues of \$43,000, as a traditionally high month for receipts. If the October/November trend continues, however, we will fall short of this target. This is what Karen Pastewka, Financial Secretary, wrote in her report to Session in December: "If we perform as budgeted [in December], we'll end the year just (\$6,000) in the red, all but abolishing the (\$64,000) deficit. The big question is, can we bring in the revenue? The trends of the last two months say no, my heart says yes." As in Advent, you will have to eagerly await to see if Karen's heart was rewarded with a positive December. Until then, "Rejoice!" God goes with us, no matter how our budget year ends.




