On Gratitude and Demanding a Better World

John's Gospel tells us that Jesus came as one "full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). These words are comforting, but also speak a tension in Christian spirituality. Sometimes we wish to live with complete grace with others, but uncomfortable

truths need to be spoken among broken systems and abusive relationships. And often, we can sacrifice grace for the sake of telling hard truths. The challenge is to live in the balance of living and speaking the truth in a genuine spirit of grace. Many parts of our walk with Jesus involve tensions and balance like this.

In Jesus' parable of the workers in the field (Matthew 20:1-14), we experience a story that illustrates resentment's ability to extinguish gratitude. The landowner has ensured the personal security and fortune of all workers, but those who worked the longest are embittered that they are paid the same as those who arrived late.

Gratitude is a tricky concept, especially as it is abused by so many who are uncomfortable with the grief and pain of others or who attempt to justify unjust social and economic arrangements: *You ought to be grateful!* After preaching about resentment's power to drown gratitude, I had conversations with some Waysiders about some of the pain hanging over them: dreadful diagnoses, hurtful relationships, violence and injustice in the world. Are we supposed to be *grateful* among such brokenness?

Gratitude is not a dismissal of pain nor an acceptance of injustice. We live in a broken world that demands healing, reconciliation, and correction. Jesus comes both to forgive and to proclaim a kingdom that will set the world right. We will grieve, suffer, and be angry; we should be. Gratitude does not diminish those realities, but asks us to be in touch with a reality deeper than the world's hurt: that creation, life, existence itself is a gift; that our lives and world are filled with gifts that bear witness to the generosity, faithfulness, and love of God. Suffering and wrong are interwoven into all things, but we do not lose sight of the original goodness of a world made in love. Our orientation to that reality—known as gratitude—grounds us in that goodness and love, gives us eyes to recognize the giftedness that is life. Gratitude reassures us in hope as we work for healing in our world. It preserves our hearts from succumbing to resentment as we truthfully acknowledge what demands healing and correction.

May we all walk in wisdom as we live in the tensions of grace and truth, righteousness and peace, and gratitude in the midst of a world desperately out of whack.

BUDGET BYTES from the Budget/Finance Committee

We will make this a quick report on August's financial picture. The official August revenue numbers do not reflect the income generated from your *Erie Gives* donations because we did not receive our check from The Erie Community Foundation until after August 30. On paper it looked like receipts were short by (\$140,000) for the month but when you read the "Budget Bytes" detailing September's finances in next month's newsletter, you will get a better picture of where we stand in terms of revenue. (For an early preview, you can read about those *Erie Gives* numbers elsewhere in this newsletter.)

Another revenue source continues to perk along and that is the Per Capita Appeal. We have surpassed our goal of \$6,000 by \$1,000, yet in August we received an additional \$126 which is gratifying. Each additional donation helps to whittle down our on-going budget deficit, so if you have not contributed your \$33 per each confirmed member of your family, we will happily receive your gift through December.

Expenses for August showed a savings of \$8,000; however, a portion of that will go right back out in September to cover some August bills that were held off. Therefore, we will also have a better picture of where we stand on expenses in September's report.

Thanks be to God for guiding us through all the ups and downs of this journey to advance God's kingdom through Wayside. We are never alone on this path and there is no uncertainty about that.

ERIE GIVES 2023 ANOTHER SUCCESS FOR THE COMMUNITY & FOR WAYSIDE

Erie Gives again received tremendous support from the Erie community, topping last year's total, as it has for the past 13 years in a row (\$8,269,362 from 10,234 donors benefitting 492 nonprofits). 93 Waysiders contributed to the success of this annual fundraiser sponsored by The Erie Community Foundation, both

in terms of the gifts you gave to benefit Wayside's ministry and mission efforts, as well as your support through your donations to other local nonprofits (our +2 concept).

We received a check from *Erie Gives* for \$159,150 which included \$7,936 in matching funds. \$30,000 of those monies are prepaid 2024 pledges and thus will be held in reserve. 25% of the matching funds (\$1,984) will be directly returned to the community via our mission allocations, as determined by the Outreach Committee. The balance of this match will enable us to support other Wayside programs and mission opportunities, all made possible by your gifts. Thanks to all Waysiders who were able to generously support *Erie Gives* in 2023.



REFORMATION SUNDAY

October 29

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther posted his Ninety -Five Thesis on the doors of the Wittenberg Cathedral. These propositions, which disputed Church practices of the time sparked the idea that the Church could be questioned. Over time, this sparked a movement known as the Reformation, which went in several different directions, but was based on the idea that the Church's authority could be questioned based on the teachings of scripture.

That movement would eventually move throughout Europe. Scottish Reformers would find their way to America, where they established what would become the Presbyterian Church.

On October 29, Wayside will honor the historic legacy of the Reformation and the Presbyterian Church in two ways:




